Dear Art,

Thanks for helping out at the lake survey yesterday! The kids learnt a lot about the Dragonfly Lake and Kingfisher Lake and so did I! I have always known that water from the Marina Reservoir is pumped into the wetland and fed into our Kingfisher Lake, then circulated through, into the Dragonfly Lake. Then, it is discharged back into the Marina Reservoir.

But I didn't realise this process of running the water through the Gardens and through our plant eco-filters actually helps to clean the water! I had no idea that our aquatic plants were natural eco-filters, absorbing excess nutrients from the water.
